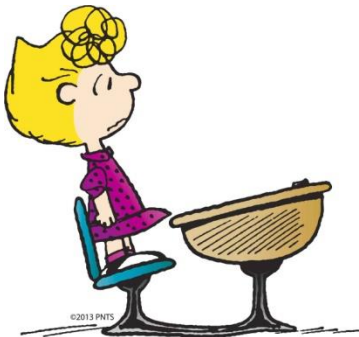




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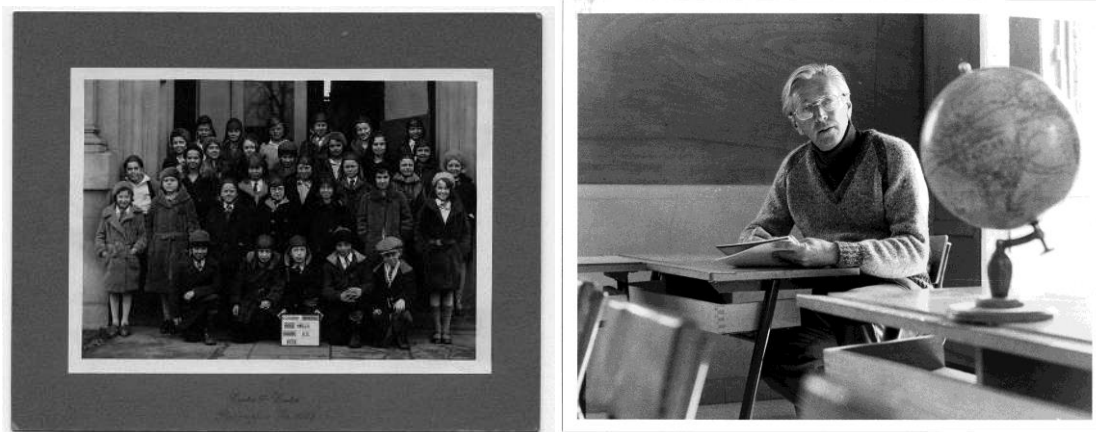
Its Back-to-School Celebrated the *Peanuts* Way with *School Projects* Exhibition September 4, 2013 – March 2, 2014

(Santa Rosa, CA) Do you remember the endless grind of book reports, show and tell, and science and art projects in elementary school? From Lucy experimenting with Linus and his beloved blanket for the Science Fair to Sally questioning the validity of a “C” given to her coat hanger sculpture, the *Peanuts* Gang has also experienced the anxieties, pressures, and triumphs of completing school assignments.

School Projects, the newest exhibition at the Charles M. Schulz Museum and Research Center, will transport pupils current and former back to the classroom as Peppermint Patty, Charlie Brown, and the others pass and fail their way through the academic calendar. Featuring over 30 original strips and displays of *Peanuts* collectable school supplies, *School Projects* will run September 4, 2013 through March 2, 2014.

Charles Schulz's own academic trials often served as inspiration for the strip. As a student, Schulz was advanced a half grade on two occasions, which he felt hindered him academically, and "As a result I was either the smallest or dumbest kid in the whole class for the next several years. I just couldn't keep up," he said in a 1983 interview for the *California English* magazine.

As a father of five, Schulz's everyday dealings with his own children's academic accomplishments provided him with many comic situations for his characters. When his own son Monte received a "C" grade on an assignment where he attempted to sculpt a baseball pitcher out of coat hangers, Schulz transformed the incident into one of his most sought after strips featuring a befuddled Sally questioning her teacher's logic. He said of the strip in *Peanuts Jubilee*, "Sally made a good instrument for this kind of idea, for she is a character who expresses indignation well, and who is completely puzzled by all the things she has to go through in school."
